A note for Master Gardeners-in-Training

A number of MGiTs have made good headway in completing all the requirements to becoming a Certified Master Gardener. Your Board has decided (with agreement from Vancouver Island University) that if you have completed the 65 required advice hours and have had your 25 plant IDs completed and approved by your Mentor you can apply to graduate at the end of our year which is marked by the AGM.

If you are still needing to complete the requirements, you will graduate at the 2022 AGM. This arrangement applies only to the class of 2019 due to the lack of clinics in 2020 and MGiTs being unable to get the required hours in the usual 2 year period.

And finally: The Canadian Garden Council would like 2022 to be officially designated (through the federal Government) as "Year of the Garden". If you want to participate in this undertaking, contact GARDENSCANADA.ca or email <u>director@gardencouncil.ca</u>.

Provincial Council Meeting – February 16, 2021

Brief Summary of Discussions and Actions

• President Mike Juleff welcomed 13 members to the meeting. All chapters were represented. Mike announced that Karen Bennett (Past President) will stay on Council in a consulting capacity to assist with the website upgrade.

• Rachael Fleming of the Okanagan Chapter was appointed to the position of President Elect.

• The Council agreed to use some of our financial surplus to upgrade the website.

• Treasurer Lynne Chrismas informed us that our Liability Insurance will not cover us in the event that a member of the public contracts the coronavirus at a master gardener event.

• Victoria Chapter will organize a virtual MGABC AGM for Sunday, September 26, 2021.

• A manual is under development that will assist with chapters organizing virtual events.

• The Website Upgrade Committee is working with all the chapters for the benefit of our members, the chapters and the public. Chapters were encouraged to provide input to the upgrade.

• Consolidated Chapter Reports have been provided to all Chapter Reps for distribution to their members.

• Chapters are being creative about providing members with virtual clinics and continuing education opportunities.

• Several master gardeners from around the province participated in a Q and A for the virtual Farm Folk City Folk Seedy Saturday Conference February 19 to 21. It was very informative and well done. Questions were sent in via the Chat feature of Zoom from well over 150 participants.

• Council members discussed how we would refer to students doing the Basic Training, as well as those in their first and second years prior to becoming certified. We all agreed that we would refrain from using any terms that might carry an insulting or derogatory connotation. More discussion at the next meeting.

• While there are many restrictions right now on our members completing public education and continuing education requirements, we all agreed to share information, resources and Zoom presentations so that our members can continue to learn and be involved.

Jill Wright announced that this would be her last meeting as Vancouver Chapter Rep on the Council. We thanked Jill for her long and valuable service.

VIMGA's Library Project Takes off with Zoom - submitted by Jo Canning

So, my friends, this is really a sales pitch. I hope it will create some interest, though. As you know, the library speakers project began in 2018 when we were contacted by VIRL, and asked to offer a monthly gardening seminar. This year it has turned into a wildly successful venture for VIMGA. Here's some statistics.

The most registrants for the 2019 and 2020 years was 25, with 13 attendees as the highest number of bodies in the room (50% is standard). For most in-person clinics, this constituted a good number, especially considering that 8 questions has been the average asked at an old-style venue, and these are a one-of, not a complete teaching session for the public.

Since we began on Zoom in November 2020, our top number has been 90 (!!!) with 40 attendees -- the silver lining in the Covid cloud. Feedback and suggestions have been very useful!

- About 40% of the attendees have been MGs. We are expanding our marketing, so hope to see more of the public (as a ratio) as the year moves forward.
- As of this year, seminars are recorded and offered on VIRL's UTUBE channel, making VIMGA's work part of the library's collection, and ensuring the public can access reliable, science-based gardening knowledge. This also allows us to offer pre-recorded seminars to garden clubs in the future.
- Because 2019 was the first full year after we set it up in 2018, and then we were hit with COVID, I
 agreed to keep it going for 2021. April Ripley (the adult education coordinator at VIRL) and I have developed the project's evolution and repaired glitches so it is running smoothly. April put in <u>a lot</u> of work behind the scenes for VIMGA, and continues to do so, not only organizing and administrating the Zoom
 sessions as secretary and Zoom host, but has also created reading lists, tended to ongoing marketing
 through the U-tube channel, expanding VIRL's attendee capacity, sending out speaker's handouts ahead
 of the seminar, and compiling a monthly feedback and survey document.

To help the project on our end, the executive has made a generous decision to increase the volunteer hours credited per engagement (from 1:3 ratio = 6 volunteer hours, to 1:4 ratio = 7.5 hrs). This has made a very big difference in supporting members having trouble covering their volunteer commitment during Covid.

For those who are unclear on how the project is set up:

- 1. Each month VIRL (usually on a Saturday at 1300h.), VIRL hosts a gardening seminar of 1.5 hours
- 2. VIRL markets it on-line, through their events calendar, on their poster board at the branch, and with bookmark handouts at the library checkout desks.
- 3. I've been acting as the over-all project CC (much as a DP might do...): deciding on subject matter focus; recruiting speakers from our membership; making up the schedule with April. This year's focus is food crops, so 6 of the 11 seminars have been about various aspects of growing vegetables.
- 4. The project coordinator puts the schedule on the Master List so members can add it their volunteer and education hours.
- 5. The speakers act as their own CC, so does the rest of the admin work and reporting.
- 6. When a MGITs signs up to speak, the project coordinator (this year, yours truly) acts as CC / fact checker / mentor as per VIMGA regulations, and earns 1.0 hour volunteer hours per this type of seminar arrangement for this.

I've found getting the project off the ground enjoyable, but I really need some assistance to keep it going into the future. Can you help? Here are some possibilities:

- A hearty soul can take over as Project Coordinator for 2022. Your planning work would begin in October this year, and finish up when the seminars are added to the Master List for next year. The main work is in the spring, as it is with a D.P. Depending on the roster of speakers, you may also act as a CC for any MGITs who want to offer a seminar. I can let you know the approximate number of hours in a volunteer year.
- This is a VIMGA-wide project community outreach initiative even though it is held in the Nanaimo District; if 2 or 3 MGs and/or MGITs want to form a committee to steer the project, it would be much less work. It isn't a complex project, and I would make myself available to help if you need it for 2022.

Please contact me if you want to work on this project, even if you do not want to run the whole thing. I'll host an informational Zoom meeting for all interested parties. No obligation to sign on. Once you get the info and understand the scope of the work, you can decide. My e-mail is <u>suncoastpearl@gmail.com</u>.

Record of Hours Update

Filling Out Your Record of Volunteer Hours Form

One of our duties as Master Gardeners is to record the number of hours we spend providing advice, continuing our education, and helping with the administration of the Vancouver Island Master Gardeners Association.

The way we do that is by filling out the Record of Volunteer Hours form, found on the VIMGA members' website (https://vimga.org/). When you login to the website, you will see a menu on the righthand side of the page. Click on "Forms" and the "Update Your Record of Volunteer Hours" link will be on the top of the menu that appears. Click on that to show the form and the hours that you have recorded there.

At the top of the form, you'll see a drop-down menu with current clinic year: 2021. If you want to view or change a previous year's form, choose the year you want to view vour name and below that you can see the minimum advice and education hours required for your membership status: "CMG", "MGiT1", "MGiT2", "Alumnus" or "Lifetime".

Then, the table: this table lists your VIMGA activities for the year and the number of hours spent on each activity.

The first column is the status: a checkmark indicates that this is an advice clinic and the Clinic Report Form has been completed for this clinic; an "x" indicates that this is an advice clinic for which no report has been filed; a dash "-"

means that this is an advice clinic which has not yet occurred; and a bullet (dot or small circle) indicates that this is not a clinic, but some other activity that you have entered onto the form.

The second column is a description of the activity. If this is an advice clinic, the description is filled for you by the system. The description for non-advice clinic activities is filled in by you.

The next two columns are for advice hours. The first of these, labeled "Clinic Advice Hours", indicates hours spent at an advice clinic and, like the description, is filled in for you. You cannot change this number. The second of these columns is labeled "Other Advice Hours" and this is where you record hours spent on non-clinic activities such article writing, giving presentations or lectures and other advice activities.

Note that while you cannot change the number of hours from that menu. Below that is shown for advice clinics, there are two methods of adjusting the hours you receive for that clinic. If, for instance, the clinic was scheduled to last for 1.5 hours, and that's what you were credited with on your form, but you realize that you had to leave half-anhour earlier, you can ask the Clinic Co-ordinator for that clinic to adjust your time on the Clinic Report Form. Another adjustment is adding hours to the "Other Advice Hours" column; Clinic Coordinators, for instance, get an extra hour of advice credit for being the Clinic Coordinator would go on the same line as the clinic in "Other Advice



Hours" column.

The next two columns, columns five and six, are for Continuing Education hours, attending lectures, watching webinars, etc., and Administration hours such as attending committee or Board of Directors meetings, the business portions of the AGM or Spring Education Day, VIMGA event preparations, etc.

Finally, the bottom of the table are totals of all of the hours shown in each of the columns. Remember that your total advice hours is the sum of the "Clinic Advice Hours" column and the "Other Advice Hours" column.

The "Save" button at the very bottom the form will record all of your information into the database. You can reopen the form at any time to add new activities or edit existing entries. After you click "Save", you will be shown a summary page, echoing the information entered into the database, and you will receive an email showing you your current record.

Certification Requirements (by Oct. 31, 2021)

Master Gardeners: 1 MGiT's—2019 cohort: 6 2

15 hours advice, 10 hours education
65 hours advice—over these two years,
20 hours education—10 in each year 2021 & 2022
Plant identification to be completed by Oct. 31, 2021

A. Garden Advice Party Clinic

In person session amongst VIMGA District members only, to mimic pre-COVID GAP.

- CMG Clinic Coordinator will prepare the questions to be asked of participants.
- Participants will receive advice time equal to the actual amount of time of the clinic, Clinic Coordinator will receive 1 extra hour for preparation
- All pandemic protocols must be followed

B. Virtual Advice Clinics

Virtual sessions created to mimic in-person clinics like those prior to COVID.

- Zoom session length will be 1.5 hours = 1.5 hours of advice clinic hours for all participants
- Participants will be given their questions a minimum of 1 week ahead to allow them to do research. CC also encouraged to add one question during the clinic that was not given beforehand to mimic the experience of an in-person, community clinic
- CC and MGiTs will be able to accrue up to 2 additional hours of advice for researching and preparing answers, up to a max of 3.5 hours per VAC.

- CMGs will be able to accrue up to 1 additional hour of advice for researching and preparing answers, up to a max of 2.5 hours per VAC
- MGiTs may earn only 35 hours of their 65 hour requirement via Virtual Advice Clinics

C. Gardening Advice Line

The Milner Gardening Advice Line regular season season March 30 to October 31 is done via email.

- One session = 3 advice hours per person. Coordinator is Karen Bennett.
- The busy months of the regular season (May and June) will have 1 CMG and 2 MGITs for each session. For the rest of the regular season, each team will be 1 CMG and 1 MGIT.
- The winter months

 (November through March)
 will also now be covered by
 email. Two MGITs from a list
 of those who signed up will
 be given 1 question on
 which to confer and answer,
 the next question will go to
 the next 2 MGITs on the list,
 etc. 1 question = 1 advice
 hour/person. All answers are reviewed by the
 Administrator, Dorothee Kieser, prior to being sent to
 the questioners.


D. Plant Picks/ Frequently Asked Questions

These are coordinated by Kay Howard. Current Plant Picks are full for this year, but the FAQs still need participants.

- 1 Plant Picks article = up to 2 advice hours
- 1 FAQ and answer = up to 2 advice hours
- E. **Demonstration Garden at Milner/Plant** As with all of the in-person events, if these are a "go", they need to follow the pandemic protocols at Milner Gardens and Woodland and the Provincial Health guidelines.
- 1 hour = 1 hour advice, or
- 5 questions = 1 hour

F. Video Clips

 20 - 60 second clip on a topic of your choice to be posted on the Milner Gardens web site. Coordinated by Dorothee Kieser



G. Video presentations

- Presentations on gardening topics to outside groups or through VIRL
- One hour presentation = 5 advice hours (1 for the presentation and 4 for preparation).


