Recognition Awards The American Rhododendron Society

Silver Medal Award

Congratulations, Silver Medal Winners!

Milner Gardens and Woodland held a gathering for all members of the District 1 of the American Rhododendron Society (all BC Chapters of the ARS). It was held in the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden which was established with help from all District 1 clubs and opened 4 years ago. Part of the occasion was to celebrate two members who were awarded the Silver Medal of the ARS. On the left you see Douglas Justice who has spoken to VIMGA on several occasions, most recently at the 2022 Spring education day and of special significance to us: Chris Southwick on the right.

Chris comes from a long line of Rhododendron Enthusiasts: Her grandparents, Ted and Mary Greig, for whom the Milner Rhodo species garden is named were friends of Veronica Milner and many of the hybrids they created are found in the gardens. Greig hybrids are also found in Van Dusen Gardens, Stanley Park and UBC Botanical Gardens. For all their work, they received the highest medal of the ARS: The Gold Medal. Chris' parents were also great rhododendron growers and received the ARS Bronze Medal. And now Chris received the Silver Medal. Very well-deserved as we all know from her talks on rhododendrons and companion plants and for her wonderful garden.

The New Face of VIMGA is Up and Running

Our new website went live in mid-March and is located at: https://www.vimga.org.

The new website is available to both the public and to VIMGA members. Obviously, the public access is limited, but provides information about what VIMGA is all about and how to contact us. Both the public and members have access to events calendars and links to

other resources, such as local garden clubs and nurseries, plant databases, and more. Members-only sections include the VIMGA Members' Manual, the membership list, with full contact information, and, of course, access to the Record of Volunteer Hours form, clinic forms and reports and statistical information.

If you are uncertain about how to access the site, go to: https://www.vimga.org/ documentation/docs-access-instructions/ (no login required to access). That will give you full instructions for accessing the site and how to enter/change your password.

Each row in the RoVH represents one activity: an advice clinic, attending/viewing an educational event, attending a VIMGA committee meeting, etc. **Note that advice clinic hours are automatically added by the system, based on information entered by the District Planners; you cannot change this entry.**

The "**Clinic Advice Hours**" column shows hours for each of the Advice Clinics you signedup for. The next column, "**Other Advice Hours**" are for advice hours that are not included in clinics. This will include GAPs (Garden Advice Parties), writing GAL (Garden Advice Line, in conjunction with Milner Gardens) articles, writing articles for other publications, outside presentations (to other clubs or organizations), etc. You are responsible for entering this information by creating a new row (using the "Add Row" button) and filling in the appropriate info.

NOTE that your total advice hours for the year are the sum of the Clinic Advice Hours and the Other Advice Hours.

The next two columns, "**Continuing Education**" and "**Admin**", are similar to Other Advice Hours: you must add a row and enter the appropriate information. The system will not do it for you.

"What Would Jeremy Say?" By Beth Walrond

Jeremy Clarkson took over the management of his 1000-acre farm in the Cotswold and ran it himself. <u>Clarkson Farm</u> documents his experiences, frustrations with the weather, government regulations and the local council. It is sometimes hilarious and often painful to watch a man with no experience in farming launch another unresearched plan or idea. I put myself into his efforts, purely in my imagination, to share one idea.

Jeremy and I are having an administrative meeting in his office. Spring planting schedule is priority. Before he launches into his next crazy idea, I want to make sure he knows about a somewhat controversial idea that may help his crops.

"So, Jeremy, do you have this year's copy of The Old Farmer's Almanac?" I ask.

"Why, do I need that?" Jeremy is quick to respond.

"For the Moon phase dates, of course," I say.

"What?" he says, looking a bit confused and wary.

"Yes, you need it for knowing when to plant. The moon gravitational pull at the New Moon creates a soil tide that helps seeds absorb water and break open faster. The plants are also stronger and better established when you plant and transplant by the phases of the moon."

Farming is new to Jeremy. He has learned so much in his first year. But this is news to him. His brow furrows and he wait for me to continue, so I lay it out. Just the main points. I don't want to overload his mind.

I continue:

There is the waxing of the moon and the waning of the moon.

Two days before the New Moon plant short and extra-long-germinating seeds (that is most vegetables and herbs) in flats or beds.

In the seven days following the new moon there is a balanced increase in the rate of root and new leaf grown. In the second 7 days there is an increase in leaf growth rate. At the full moon Transplant seedlings from flats into beds and plant long germinating seeds (most flowers) in flats and/or beds.

In the third seven days following the full moon there is an increased root growth. And the last 7 days, as the moon wanes there is balanced decrease in rate of root and leaf growth. This is a resting period.

I stop talking as Jeremy rolls his eyes and looks askance.

And this is what Jeremy said.

"This is all bullocks".

"No, no it isn't." I reply." My grandfather swears by all this and I didn't believe him till, one year unintentionally, I planted my carrots at the time of the new moon and they germinated in 4 days instead of the usual 10 to 14 days. Now, I just get the chart of the time and date for phases of the moon for our area and have it by my planning calendar. Of course, if the weather is too wet or too cold you may have to wait a bit, but there is some leeway."

I leave him to think about it. I am sure he will come up with a plan.

It has been a great opportunity to learn from the garden owners about air layering with rhododendrons and the hugelkultur method of gardening, the use of sheep manure for fantastic rose blooms, crevice gardening, and the advantage of garden rooms on a small city lot.

Thank you to our members including Joanne, Jo Canning, Fern Hietkamp, April Johnston, Ute Holewa, and Jacqueline Sherk. Rain, rain, and more rain! We are certainly into January now, having lived through Maycember! And I know many of you will cringe, but my tomatoes are in the ground and doing OK. Potatoes are doing well, the deep crimson flowers on the favas and the bright yellow Brassica blossoms are attracting many pollinators, but no scapes on the garlic, yet. Strange times, indeed.

Our district planner, Chris Southwick wanted me to pass along her thanks to the Nanaimo members "for putting up with all of the emails and also to all of the Nanaimo members and a few others for stepping up to ensure

that all of the clinics have been filled this spring and summer." She also notes there are still a few clinics that are able to add a third member (see the clinic list on the website: <u>https://www.vimga.org/reports/advice-clinic-table</u>), if anyone needs to add more hours.

The Nanaimo District has 57 clinics that have been conducted or planned, for a total of about 535 advice hours. Small and Smallish Trees for City Gardens

The following are all relatively "easy care" and disease and pest resistant, as long as the soil drains, there is good air circulation and modicum of summer moisture and full sun (unless otherwise indicated). Invasives have been stripped from the list. Broadleaf plants are deciduous unless otherwise noted. Conifers are evergreen.

Abies koreana Abies pinsapo (deep soil best) Acer buergerianum Acer circinatum (best in part shade) Acer griseum Acer japonicum (best in part shade) Acer komarowii (syn. 
